The chairman, Rep. Al Patton, opened the meeting.

PRESENT: Representatives Al Patton, Sarna, Biersdorf Senators Earl Renneke and Collin Peterson

Fiduciary Standards and Liability (HF 2395 (Patton); SF 2339 (Peterson) L. Martin went over the staff memo; also, comments in regard to fiduciary responsibility from TRA and from the State Board of Investment were considered.

It was reported that the TRA Board of Trustees has no authority to advise TRA on investments. This situation is unique with this fund.

Discussion followed relative to questioning whether there is a need for a fiduciary responsibility law, definition of fiduciary responsibility, and the need to act on some type of state standards on responsibility.

Paul Groschen, Exec. Dir. of MSRS, advised that Congress has amended the IRS Code so that the plan can be more flexible; that the Minnesota law was changed to offer a fixed and variable annuity through private. carriers

Lyle Farmer, Sec/Treas of the StPTRFA, discussed his views relative to whether there is a need for annual valuations in terms of the value to the fund. Because of the cost of annual valuations, he recommended biennial valuations.

Harvey Schmidt, Exec. Dir of TRA, spoke about the time frame that his fund has to work around; that it needs more time for the valuations.

Gus Welter, Volunteer Firefighters, discussed the limits on death benefits enacted in the 1979 law; certain death benefits were historically paid by certain volunteer associations which are now outlawed by the 1979 legislation.
